Morinville Strongman is helping others while battling cancer

Morinville resident and Crushers Supplements and Gym owner Scott “Crusher” Wallace is no stranger to Strongman competitions.

Wallace, who was previously named Washington State’s strongest man, BC and Alberta’s Strongest Man, and won a national competition in his class, underwent a rigorous 16-week training schedule last year to compete in two significant events in Arizona and Saskatchewan.

After competing in those events, he learned he had metastatic carcinoma cancer, had surgery last December and battled his way through treatment to once again start training himself and others.

A few months after learning he was cancer-free, the athlete discovered that the disease had travelled.

“I now have bone and liver cancer,” Wallace said, adding that it had advanced to stage 4 cancer in his

spine, femur, and liver. “I’m ready for battle and just going to go in and fight every day until it’s either gone or I die, one of the two,” Wallace said, adding while he has achieved many of his life goals, he wants to see his daughter married, his son’s football career continue, and seeing others achieve their goals with his help.

“I still like seeing people achieve their goals,” he said. “I’ve won strongman. I’ve been to the world level. Now, I enjoy seeing other people achieve their goals. I look at it as I have so much to give that I will give everything I can to help others achieve their goals and achieve the same success I’ve achieved. That’s my legacy. That’s what I want to leave behind.”

PUBLIC HEARING - BYLAW 1597/22
 Amendment to the Land Use Bylaw 1385/17 - Diversified Agriculture

In accordance with Section 606 of the Municipal Government Act, Sturgeon County Council is requesting public input on proposed Bylaw 1597/22. This Bylaw proposes to amend the Land Use Bylaw by enacting recommendations of the Agribusiness and Agritourism Review Task Force Recommendations Report including, but not limited to:

- Creation of Event Venue use and related regulations.
- Creation of Diversified Agriculture use and related regulations.
- Amending the AG - Agriculture District to allow Diversified Agriculture as a permitted use.
- Creation of an AG2 -Agriculture 2 District to allow more intensive agricultural uses as permitted uses.
- Allow the gathering of development information to be used to trial an Impact Matrix.
- Other related changes.

Proposed amendments to the Bylaw since the June 14, 2022 Public Hearing include:

- Removing Event Venue use from the AG - Agriculture District.
- Clarification of Diversified Agriculture definition.
- Other related changes.

Changes to Victim Services concern local unit

Alberta's shift to a zonal model for Victim Services has left Sturgeon Victim Services (SVS) concerned that a third of their clients could be alone in dealing with trauma.

Under the current model, there are 71 victim service units across the province, including the one operating out of the Morinville detachment. With the changes announced by the Government of Alberta, they will move to a model that uses four zones.

Each zone will include a governing board, an executive director, and a team of 10 centralized professional support staff (CPSS). Under those four groups will be 131 case workers for all of Alberta.

"They are changing Victim Services from victims of crime and trauma to victims of crime only, so any matters that are non-criminal, we would not be responding to," said Sturgeon Victim Services Executive Director Elisabeth Melvin.

"They are promising that we can stay within our communities, still work within our detachment, but with the promise that we can also move within the zone."

Although Melvin said there are some positives with the new model, including increased resources and funding for victims of crime and a pay grid for workers in the system, she and the Sturgeon Victim Services Board are hesitant about the new

model. "We've built such solid community connections, recognizing many hands make light work," she said, adding she feels the power of community stakeholders is in jeopardy.

Loss of trauma response concerning

Approximately one-third (157) of Sturgeon Victim Services' 423 outreach calls as of Sept. 9, 2022, have been non-criminal calls. The forthcoming changes would mean that those 157 calls would go unanswered, at least by Victim Services.

"Sudden death calls, suicide referrals, structure fires that are non-criminal, farm accidents, domestic disputes – all of those are non-criminal matters unless proven otherwise," Melvin said. She notes that none of those calls would be responded to by her unit.

When a family escapes a house fire in minus 40 weather with nothing but the clothes on their back, SVS is there to assist when everyone is in shock, holding their babies, and watching their house burn. In such a situation, SVS shows up with a blanket and a set of clothing for everyone and walks them through the following steps, even if that is getting them hotel accommodations.

"We'll go shopping for them, make sure their babies are fed," Melvin said, noting that SVS does the calling to Red Cross on their behalf for assistance. But beyond a

hand on the shoulder for victims of a house fire, SVS and other victim service units are also there to be by the side of those whose loved one has committed suicide.

"Say a child comes home from school and finds one of their parents hanging; that child is traumatized. A surviving parent comes home – they are in shock as well," Melvin said.

In such a case currently, SVS would attend the scene with two workers, one of whom would sit with the child to comfort them as best they could.

The other worker would speak to the surviving adult and connect them to the following steps, including contacting the Office of the

Medical Examiner.

"Then we would talk to them in the days to come, as the shock wears off, about mental health supports in the area we feel are pertinent to children and adults," Melvin explained. "If this new zonal model comes into play, we will not be called out.

Melvin sees SVS's work with trauma victims, a third of this year's calls, as critical.

"It is exponential in our world," Melvin said. "It is why we exist. We don't look at matters as criminal and non-criminal. We look at a person who has gone through trauma and meeting their immediate needs. We're there

to meet that need, and I feel, especially for rural Albertans, they are going to suffer the most. We're going to see a great reduction of even mental health support for our people as well as our RCMP and EMS workers. They're going to be tied up trying to emotionally regulate people instead of being released to do their jobs."

SVS is not alone in its concern about the program changes. In a letter to Minister of Justice and Solicitor General Tyler Shandro, Tofield Mayor Debora Dueck called the changes shocking

Houle Drive to spend more time working one-on-one with his clients to help them achieve those health and fitness goals.

"I made the decision in June that I wanted to expand into personal training more," Wallace said. "Once I started taking on more clients, I found that I was at the store all day and was only able to train clients before and after store hours."

That problem led to the solution of moving his supplement business to his home, where he could work with both his supplement and training clients easier.

The new model, Crushers Supplements and Gym, offers a wide variety of supplements and nutritional products with Wallace's experience in fitness training, both one-on-one and online.

On the supplement side,

Wallace explained that protein is for everyone as it repairs your muscles. "Even if you are not working out intensely and you just need to supplement more protein into your diet, the Isolate protein is nice because it is low in calories and low in carbs," he said. "If all you do for exercise is walking, it's still good to have that protein to help retain muscle."

Wallace said he uses an app called Train Heroic, programming his online and in-person client's schedules on Sunday nights so they can see what is required in the week ahead.

"When they open the app, they can see exactly what they have to do. I can track the app, so I know how their progress is and if they are working out or not," Wallace said. "I can use that app to help increase their progress even though I'm not there with them one-on-one."

and disappointing and said the MLA-led review did not fully engage Victim Services Units.

"[We] can not fathom the rationale behind this decision, once again without input or consultation from those that this affects most. In our opinion this is a recipe for disaster and stands to only continue to fail rural Alberta," Dueck wrote the minister in late August.

Services are encouraging residents concerned with the changes to contact their MLAs to express their concerns on the changes to the program.

"Picture yourself in a situation where you come home, and a loved one is deceased," Melvin said.

"Do you want somebody standing with you saying these are the next steps in your time of shock, or do you want to handle that on your own? That's what it comes down to."

One of Wallace's training clients is Marion Peterson, who came to Wallace to help achieve her weight loss and fitness goals. "He's amazing - the best coach I ever had," Peterson said. "I lost seven pounds in three weeks."

Pederson is not alone in admiring Wallace as a coach and person. Byron Gilks recently started coming from out of town to work with Wallace on his own fitness goals. "Scott is an awesome guy - strong as hell to be going through what's going on and still staying strong for everyone else," Gilks said.

One-room school house on display at the museum

One of the newer exhibits at the Musée Morinville Museum is a recreation of the one-room school that was common in Rural Alberta right up until the 1960s. There – students of various ages and academic abilities were taught in one room by one teacher.

The exhibit includes rows of desks and slates used by students long before electronics were commonplace. There are also numerous books that children would use to learn to read and understand mathematics, music, art and the history and geography of their country and province.

One interesting item to help children learn about geography is this map of The Dominion of Canada produced by Neilsen in 1956 and given to schools for free under the condition that the lettering and images on the map would not “be removed or obliterated in anyway.” Neilsen also made free world maps with similar branding and product placement back in the 1930s.

Dolls, alphabet blocks and games like jacks were commonplace in the

schoolyard for students who were attentive in their studies.

Of course, not all children were eager to learn or behave in class. For such occasions, a dunce cap could wind up on that student’s head while sitting in the corner as an example to other students. The Dunce cap takes its name from a 13th-century Scottish theological academic named John Duns, although there is no record of one mentioned before the nineteenth century.

The teacher’s job was a difficult one, and often short-lived, no matter how well students behaved. Rural teachers often made far less than their urban counterparts. Teachers were typically unmarried women between the ages of 17 and 23, and turnover was relatively high. At the time, teaching was seen as temporary employment for a young woman until she married and began working at home.

This antiquated societal view is a stark contrast to the high regard teaching has in society today.

A set of teacher’s rules from 1915, taken from the Sacramento Schoolhouse Museum, illustrates how restrictive the job was at

the turn of the last century.

Teachers were not allowed to marry or be in the company of men during their contract term. They had to be home between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. unless attending a school function; they were not to hang around downtown ice cream parlours, and they couldn’t leave city limits without permission of the school board chair. They also had to serve as a school

custodian, sweeping the floor daily and scrubbing the floor at least once a week.

Other items in the museum’s replica classroom include the Union Jack, Canada’s flag until the adoption of the Maple Leaf in 1965, and a handmade clock built to help students learn to tell time.

From card catalogues that helped students find books long before they could be

downloaded electronically to a map of Morinville from the early 1900s, this exhibit helps visitors understand how students learned about the world around them years ago.

The Musée Morinville Museum is open Wednesday through Saturday from noon until 5 p.m. and can be accessed through St. Jean Baptiste Park on 100 Avenue.

Statement from Morinville Mayor Boersma re: pedestrian safety

Pedestrian safety is of paramount concern for the Town.

We recognize it is a shared responsibility – for drivers, pedestrians, school boards, parents, and the municipality – and it is clear we all need to redouble our efforts.

Council and Administration continue to work diligently with all stakeholders to ensure we find solutions for this ongoing challenge.

I personally have already met with Government officials, and I know my fellow Council colleagues are actively advocating on the matter.

At last night’s Regular Meeting of Council, Council directed me to invite both local school boards and Ministers Panda and Nally to a meeting to discuss the ongoing concerns, responsibilities, and solutions for Hwy 642. We must resolve the issues collaboratively, creating safe passage for all.

I have scheduled a meeting for Monday with GSACRD and Sturgeon Public Schools to begin this vital work.

We have actively addressed the growing concerns at Grandin Drive and Hwy 642 (100 Avenue). Specifically, the following actions have been taken:

- Conflict analysis for Grandin and Hwy 642 (100 Avenue)
- All available safety enhancements have been installed, including:
 - Four-way stop
 - Enhanced large stop signs
 - Enhanced flashing red stop signs through special permission from Alberta Transportation
 - Targeted enforcement by Community Peace Officers (CPO)
 - Signalization or a roundabout is currently being studied and includes an update to signal warrant analysis

On October 26, 2022, Administration will be holding an open house on the functional planning study for Grandin and Hwy 642 (100 Avenue) as well as Cardiff Road and 100 Street. I encourage you to attend and share your perspectives on

the findings and potential solutions.

While I understand the heightened concern with Grandin and Hwy 642 (100 Avenue), I’d be remiss if I didn’t highlight the other actions supporting pedestrian safety that have been undertaken across the community. To date, this has included the following:

- Morinville intersection control review to standardize stop and yield signs
- School and playground reviews for all parks and schools
- Community Safety and Wellbeing Plan
- Transportation Master Plan
- Pedestrian Crossing Review
- Installed enhanced rapid flashing beacons at identified crosswalks in school zones
- Curb extensions (bulbing) along Highway 642 (100 Avenue)

- Enhanced no parking and stopping distances from 5m to 10 m at crosswalks
- Enforcement Services Traffic Safety Plan, which encompasses directed enforcement activity and education opportunities for pedestrian safety
- Positive ticketing program to promote safe crossing
- Education campaigns through social media and traditional media
- Education programs for youth pedestrians (Point, Pause, and Proceed program with Community Peace Officers)
- Education programs for high school students with RCMP School Resource Officer

I can assure you that Council is committed to finding a solution to this community challenge.

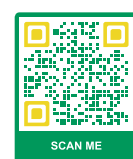
