Ice Rescue important part of Morinville Fire Department training By Stephen Dafoe said

Those taking advantage of the warm weather on April 15 and 16 with a stroll around the Fish and Game Association pond may have noticed some commotion on the ice, people who had fallen through.

But the individuals in yellow suits were in the water intentionally, party of two days of ice rescue training conducted by the Morinville Fire Department.

Morinville Fire Department Deputy Chief of Training and Logistics Charles Lavallee

the department has three in-house ice rescue trainers, all certified three years ago.

"We can provide our own ice rescue training now that I have certified trainers in-house," Deputy Chief Lavallee said. "Two of them are training Captains, and one of them is the Platoon Captain that do all our ice rescue training from year-to-year."

On Saturday, April 15, and Sunday, April 16, Captain Louis Lavallee and Captain Steven Holubowich took several Morinville firefighters

onto the ice to learn lifesaving skills.

"We have these ice rescue water suits called Mustang Suits that are waterproof, that help the firefighters float in the water with these suits," Deputy Chief Lavallee explained.

"It keeps them out of the ice-cold elements. We teach them how to get into these suits. They also learn different types of ice rescue techniques in order to perform ice rescue based on the victim's capabilities of extricating themselves out of the water, or level of consciousness." Lavallee said

firefighters learn several methods of retrieving people or animals from the water. The training always takes place as the ice starts to soften, and the danger of walking on it exists.

"To execute the training so it has some value to it, we have to wait until the ice is at that stage where you can break through; otherwise, it's hard to teach when the ice is hard," Lavallee explained.

[°]So we do wait until it softens up. It gives the guys the reality of the training – what they could come across in a real-life experience."

Deputy Chief Lavallee said training is open for the entire department, but not all firefighters take it yearly due to job schedules.

This year, over half of the department's 40 firefighters participated. The training saw the recertification of several firefighters, and the certifying of another 10.

"We feel it is a value for the town and the surrounding area because we have so many ponds in our town and surrounding area," Lavallee said.

"It's not something that's utilized very often, but when you do need it, it's great to have the capabilities of being able to perform that type of rescue for citizens of their pets."

Alberta Government confirms funding for Hwy 642 Intersection improvements

At the April 25, Regular Meeting of council, Mayor Simon Boersma shared that he received a letter just prior to the meeting confirming that the Alberta Government has committed funds for intersection improvements.

In the letter, Honourable Devin Dreeshen, Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors, confirmed that his department is committed to supporting improvements at the intersection of Highway 642 and Grandin Drive in the town of Morinville.

Transportation and Economic Corridors will contribute 60 percent of the project cost for the design and installation of the traffic signals at this intersection.

"This is an exceptionally heartwarming moment for me and all my council colleagues. We are working hard to ensure our residents' safety while crossing HWY 642," said Mayor Boersma. "The support from the Alberta Government is so appreciated, and I want to thank Ministers Nally and Dreeshen for all their hard work on behalf of our community."

Administration is working with Transportation and Economic Corridors toward executing a Memorandum of Agreement.

The balance of the funding is the responsibility of the Town of Morinville. This funding, which requires the approval of council, will be proposed for consideration in the 2024 capital budget.

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

Roseridge hosting regional Household Hazardous Waste Roundup in Morinville

County Region, regardless of where participants live.

"Until our new facility opens in 2024, household hazardous wastes are not accepted at Roseridge. We ask that residents safely store their household hazardous waste on their property for these regional events, where they can dispose of them for free. These events help us keep these items out of the landfill."

Roseridge currently holds a spring and fall event. The second event of 2023 is planned for Gibbons in the fall.

"Roseridge has taken on this role from the municipalities to support a regional effort and collaboration," Berry said.

"Rather than each of the municipalities duplicating the service and offering it on their own, we're doing it on behalf of the entire region."

Household hazardous waste products include, but are not limited to: acetone, ant/wasp spray, barbeque starters, antifreeze, car waxes and polishes, glues, hair colouring, aerosol hair spray, nail polish remover, paint thinners, rechargeable batteries, shoe polish, spa and pool chemicals, weed killers and windshield washer solutions.

Household cleaners regarded as household hazardous waste include abrasive cleaners, aerosol air fresheners, all-purpose cleaners, ammonia, bleach, disinfectants, drain cleaners, fabric softeners, glass cleaners, laundry starch, laundry stain removers, mildew removers, oven cleaners, rug and upholstery cleaners, toilet cleaners, and tub and tile cleaners.

"If you are unsure, bring it," Berry said, noting the default should be to bring everything.

In addition to the household

hazardous waste, the event will include an electronics roundup where they will accept anything with a plug, from old hair dryers to television sets.

The Prospects Hockey Club will also collect automotive batteries to fund their program during the event. Barry and the Commission hope for another successful event and encourage the area's residents to come out regardless of whether they live in Morinville, Redwater or anywhere throughout Sturgeon County.

"It's completely free. It's convenient. It's in town. Stop in and bring it, even if you have one or two items," Barry said.

"Bring those one or two items and keep them out of the landfill." Roseridge Landfill Commission is a regional partnership between Bon Accord, Gibbons, Legal, Morinville, Sturgeon County, and Redwater.

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Four MCHS Indigenous artists are taking part in ACACA art show

asked if we'd be interested in started moving on in art. I got sending some student art to the Redwater Art Show," said MCHS art teacher Tara Riccioppo, noting that the art will travel to other shows after the upcoming event.

"The Redwater Art Society offered to sponsor [students] that had Indigenous backgrounds. There are seven students showing, and four have Indigenous roots.

Four Artists - Four Styles

Artist Romeo Anthony Courteoreille-Morin's interest in art began at an early age.

"I can remember I started out with crayons and stuff like that, and I started to venture more with the medium as I aged," Courteoreille-Morin said, noting that oil paints are the preferred style these days. "My main style is graphite on paper or oil on canvas. I like to go for more of a blotchy look. I feel it adds more personality to the characters I paint. I like artists like Van Gogh." Beyond that, the artist takes inspiration from the people and places Courteoreille-Morin encounters. For 15-year-old Danica Elliot, COVID boredom prompted her to pick up the art supplies. "I was bored out of my mind, and I just started doodling on paper," she said. "I got my first sketchbook and

really interested in realism and animals."

Elliot said adding shade and being able to change the shape of an animal through the use of shading is what attracts her to the style. "

Sixteen-year-old McKenzie Nolin said art began in childhood. "I drew a lot when I was a little kid," Nolin said. "I practised every day for hours on end, and I just saw a lot of passion in it." Nolin's art aims for realism; the artist works in various mediums.

While the other artists present their creations mainly in two dimensions, Dathon Potts' work is in three, through masks. Potts said his start in art happened when he had a couple of ideas. "I looked at folklore for a bit, and I decided to get some ideas off of it," Potts said, adding his creations started on paper in one of the sketchbooks he got for his birthday. "Then I just got thinking, 'I can make masks.' I could try my best."

That trying produced results. First, a mask of a deer, and secondly, a gas mask, then an executioner - each focusing on the fearful.

"It's kind of like the Wendigo – the deer, the one that hunts down people and eats

them," Potts said. "I got the idea that this is something scary. I can make it." Indigenous Influences

For the four artists, Indigenous culture plays varying roles in their art.

Courteoreille-Morin said none of the pieces created to date had been influenced by indigenous culture, but that may soon change.

"I have ideas in my sketchbook that I haven't actively painted yet."

Danica Elliott said being Métis has had a bit of an effect on her work. "Growing up Métis, I've always been taught to care for the Earth and care for the animals," the artist said.

"I like animals, so I just continue to draw animals. I think my culture has influenced that.'

McKenzie Nolin said being Indigenous does not influence her art but that she'd love to express her culture in her art.

Dathan Potts' Wendigo mask is an example of an Indigenous influence in his work. "It's supposed to scare people. You're not supposed to talk about him," Potts said of the Indigenous folklore. " First Show For Artists

Three prominent ACCA-selected artists will jury the show, with selected works going to a province-wide show later this year.

Similarly, the Mother's Day weekend event is a first showing for Danica Elliott. "I think it's shocking because when I made these pieces, I was just doing it for myself," she said. "It's crazy to think that people from around Alberta and around the communities will see my art."

McKenzie Nolin is excited to take part in her first art show. "I'm excited but also nervous," Nolin said. "Being my first art show, I don't really know how it's going to go. I'm sure it'll be fun."

For Potts, though looking forward to the show, there is some reluctance that his creations may be gone after the art show and sale. "I also have hope that they will do good," Potts said.

Teacher Tara Riccioppo sees the upcoming show as a good experience for the student artists. "Their lives are changing so much, and there are not a lot of opportunities for this experience," she said, noting that many student artists only display their art online on galleries like DeviantArt. "It's great, but there is something about actually seeing an art show in person." Riccioppo said she is planning a field trip
