Embark on a Grand Adventure: Morinville Library's Fantasy-themed Summer Reading Program

The Morinville Community Library is making plans for its annual Summer Reading Program, running from July 1 until Aug. 13. Registration for this year's summer reading program opens on June 12.

Morinville Community Library Program Coordinator Jessica Sheppard said this year's program, A Grand Adventure, has a fantasy theme. Readers will be divided into four fantasy-related groups to compete as a unit.

"It gets a healthy amount of competition for people," she said. "Our teams are going to be Team Amethyst, Team Ruby, Team Saphire, and Team Emerald."

Sheppard said the Summer Reading Program is a program where people of all ages can utilize the summer to read.

"It's promoting literacy. We want people to have fun while they read," Sheppard said. "It's especially good for reluctant readers, if you have a reluctant reader in your family."

Sheppard said the program, which tracks reading time, incentivizes readers through activities and events where they can feel celebrated for hitting milestones. Additionally, prizes will be awarded to top readers in preschool, elementary, teen and adult divisions.

Fire and OHV ban lifted, fire restriction in effect in Sturgeon County

Effective (May 31) at 4 p.m., Sturgeon County and the towns of Bon Accord, Legal and Redwater are under a fire restriction.

The fire and OHV ban issued earlier this month has been lifted; however, open fires - including burn barrels and incinerators – and fireworks are not allowed.

All outdoor fires presently burning must be extinguished.

No new burn permits or fireworks permits will be issued, and all permits previously issued remain suspended.

You can use the following:

· recreational firepits for warming or cooking

- OHVs and ATVs
- charcoal/pellet barbecues
- propane/natural gas barbecues
- · charcoal/pellet appliances, like
- propane/natural gas appliances, like patio heaters and fire tables
- electric appliances, like smokers
- outdoor fireplaces/chimineas

Sturgeon County urges the public to use extreme caution when working or driving in grassy areas, and to keep vehicles clean and free of debris as smoldering debris can start fires.

This restriction does not apply to the use of ATVs or OHVs.

Morinville RCMP investigate serious motor vehicle collision

On May 31, 2023, at 10:10 a.m., Morinville RCMP received a report of a two-vehicle collision on Highway 28 and Sturgeon Road. Initial investigation reveals that a northbound semi truck collided with a passenger car at the intersection.

The driver of the passenger vehicle

was taken to hospital with injuries. RCMP remained on scene for several hours while workers attempted to remove the semi from the area. Southbound traffic was reduced to one lane to facilitate the vehicles removal. The investigation in the circumstances of the collision continues.

Morinville moves to fire restriction

As of 4 p.m. on May 31, the Morinville Fire Department is lifting the fire ban and moving to a fire restriction.

A fire restriction allows the use of approved recreational (backvard) fire pits, smokers and other solid-fuel appliances, with normal conditions.

Due to the continued hot weather, low precipitation levels, and the possibility of extreme grass fires, Morinville Fire Department is asking all residents to exercise caution when using their approved/permitted fire pits. Approved recreational backyard fire pits with appropriate screens are allowed but are not to be used

to burn debris or yard waste like twigs and leaves. Propane BBQ's, portable propane fireplaces and propane heaters are permitted under this restriction.

Fireworks permits for low hazard/family fireworks issued remain suspended. No new fireworks permits will be issued.







Oil and gas extraction spending in Canada



Capital spending in the oil and gas sector starts stronger in 2023

National oil and gas spending started the year on a positive note.

Seasonally-adjusted expenditures in Canada's oil and gas extraction industry reached \$9.8 billion in Q1 2023, up 5.8% from the previous quarter.

Spending was up by \$2.1 billion (+26.8%) from the same period last year and stood at the highest level since Q1 2018.

It is also interesting to note that energy companies retained a firmer stance on spending despite the recent tick down in oil

The West Texas Intermediate (WTI) benchmark averaged US\$76/ bbl in the first quarter of 2023 vs US\$83/barrel in Q4 2022 and US\$95/ bbl in Q1 2022.

Despite the significant headwinds that include volatile global energy market conditions, labour shortages and elevated cost pressures, we expect capital expenditures in the oil and gas extraction sector to improve in 2023 and 2024, but remain markedly below the high watermark for investment achieved in 2014.



Each team will have its own challenge, a page to log the collective reading minutes of the group.

Sheppard said each week would feature a new mythical creature that will form part of the program and the dropin activities connected to the program.

"For example, week two is going to be all about mermaids," she said. "I've created a narrative for people where they can make their own characters, and those characters get to go through the story as if they are doing something like a Dungeons and Dragons campaign."

Sheppard said in addition to the reading minute prizes, there will also be a draw for an award based on character creation.

Participants do not need a library card for the drop-in programs or the reading challenges; however, participants do need a library card to

sign out books.

"It's going to be really fun," Sheppard said of the month-and-a-halflong program. "Honestly, I think that the theme especially is going to be fun for kids to imagine themselves in a fantasy world.

The library sees the Summer Reading Program as an excellent way to get involved in the community and a good way to get kids out of their comfort zone, especially for in-person crafts and events.

"It'll be good for them to meet other people, especially if they enjoy going to the library," Sheppard said.

Did you know the property known as Block Three (located on the corner of 50 Avenue and 47 Street) was home to the International Harvester Company Dealership, which had been in existence since the early 1900's (when it was known as McCormick-Deering)? The lot was used for displaying farm equipment, trucks and used machinery, and the building included an office, showroom, parts area, and workshop.

Proposed Resource Extraction Changes PUBLIC HEARING –BYLAW 1607/22 Amendments to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17

In accordance with section 606 of the Municipal Government Act, Sturgeon County Council is requesting public input on new changes to proposed Bylaw 1607/22, which relates to resource extraction.

Council gave second reading to Bylaw 1607/22 on May 23, 2023. In addition to the regulations presented at the public hearing on March 15, 2023, the bylaw includes the following updates:

- Sand, gravel and clay operations and secondary processing operations would need to be at least 400 metres (quarter mile) from homes whether located in a multi lot subdivision or not.
- Silica sand and secondary processing operations would need to be at least 800 metres (half mile) from homes whether located in a multi lot subdivision or not. Silica sand is made up of at least 95 per cent silicon dioxide and less than 0.6 per cent iron oxide.

The existing and previously proposed bylaw presented on March 15, 2023, had setback distances of 400 metres between operations and single homes and 800 metres between operations and multi-lot subdivisions. The setback distances were the same for all operations, regardless of the material being mined.




