New SHC award honours the memory of community champion Murray Knight

Morinville resident and lifelong community volunteer Murray Knight was no stranger to rolling up his sleeves in the community, whether at the museum, organizing the placement of Canadian flags on lawns, or helping at area hockey rinks.

Knight, who passed away on November 8, 2022, first got involved with the [then] Morinville Minor Hockey Association in 1981.

Over the years, he Memorial held various roles, including head coach, assistant coach, goalie coach, and club president for five years.

Sturgeon ey Club (SHC) is now paying tribute Knight's legacy of volunteerism with a new annual award, The Murray Knight Future Leader Award, available to U18 graduating players across all SHC programs.

Hockey Sturgeon Club President Gene

Hock- Connors said the award came about after working with Knight's son Jason and his Grandson Kade, who serve as SHC's Sting and Mustangs/Fillies goalie consultants, respectively.

> Connors said he has been impressed with and admired Jason and Kade's work ethic and ability to resonate with the kids, getting the players to work hard and still leave smiling.

"While ing the Knight family with some others, I learned that these qualities Jason and Kade exhibit are a direct result of Murray," Connors said.

"Knowing the dedication Murray had for this community and now that his legacy is continuing on with Jason and Kade giving back to the kids of the community, the club felt it was very important to honour Murray in the best way we can."

to the youth of the community, he could make a positive impact on them that not only stuck with them through their minor hockey days but into adulthood as well," Connors said, noting that parents he has spoken to who were coached by Knight spoke to the high character, dedication, and leadership skills he taught them.

"The volunteers in our club believe that although hockey provides a variety of physical health benefits, it builds so much more socially, mentally, and emotionally. Minor sports provide an avenue for kids to escape from the

real stressors of life, such as homework, chores, and personal relationships."

Connors feels valuable lessons, including teamwork, leadership, discipline, perseverance, resilience, and respect for players and opposition, extend to coaches and parents

"Ultimately, at Sturgeon goal Hockey Club is to work with children, hoping we can develop them into fantastic human beings like Murray Knight,' Connors said.

With the deadline for nominations coming up at noon on Saturday, March 30, SHC hopes to see many nominations to choose from.

Players are asked to

submit a written application of no more than 1000 words explaining how they meet the criteria to the President of the Sturgeon Hockey Club at president@ sturgeonhockeyclub. Supporting reference letters are encouraged.

Connors encouraged individuals to review the award criteria carefully. After reflecting on whether they feel they embody Murray's values and have positively impacted their community, they should consider applying to become future leaders.

"I know we have many young children in our community that take the time to give back and are passionate about making a positive impact and we might not know about them," Connors said.

"This is their chance to let the Knight family, Sturgeon Hockey and the entire community know what great things they are doing to make the world a better place."

The Sturgeon Hockey Club Executive, in consultation with the Knight family, will select the recipient, who will receive \$1000 towards their post-secondary studies.

The award will be presented at the SHC awards night at the Morinville Community Cultural Center on April 15.







Jets fall in fifth and final game of semi-final series

The St. Albert Merchants will advance to the Capital Junior Hockey League Championship against the Beaumont Chiefs after defeating the Morinville Jets 2-1 in regulation play in the fifth and final CJHL West Division Semi-Finals game on Thursday, Mar. 14.

The Jets won the first game of the best-of-five series 4-2 on Mar. 3 but lost the second and third games 5-2 and 4-0, respectively.

With the Merchants leading the best-offive series 2-1, the Jets' fate was doubtful on Sunday, Mar. 10, as the Jets were down 2-0 after one.

Another 20 minutes passed without a single extra digit on either side's score, leaving the Jets with the final 20 minutes to keep their playoff chances alive.

The Jets narrowed St. Albert's lead to 2-1 early in the frame,

capitalized on a powerplay opportunity seven minutes later and pulled ahead to 3-2 with an unassisted shorthanded goal. An empty netter in the final minute of play won the day, pushing the series to its limit.

In Thursday's series finale, the Merchants outshot the Jets 14-6 in the opening frame. Still, neither St. Albert nor Morinville could capitalize on their chances, resulting in a scoreless first

period.

St. Albert opened scoring midway through the second period to lead 1-0, but the Jets responded with three minutes left in the period to tie it 1-1, the Merchants slightly out-chancing the Jets 27-23.

Deadlocked through the first two periods, the final 20 minutes would decide which team's season would end and which would advance to the CIHL Championships.

Once again, one to pull ahead 2-1, but this time, the Jets could not get one past St. Albert's backstop, giving the Merchants the fifth and final game and the semi-final series 2-1.

Merchants pocketed regular season captured many team and league records, including four shooters in the league's top ten, including the top three spots, and coach of the year.



oison Prevention Week

It's Poison Prevention Week (March 17-23), and Alberta Health Services (AHS) is reminding Albertans to keep kids safe and premedication vent poisonings.

Children are curious about world around them. If medications are within their reach, children may play with the bottle or try to taste colourflavoured or medications. Their smaller curiosity, size and lower body weight can put them at higher risk for poisoning.

Last year, more than one in three

Poison Centre were regarding children zero to five years of age. Many of these calls involved acetaminophen and ibuprofen. While these medicines are safe when used as recommended for treating common aches, pains and fevers, they can be harmful if taken incorrectly.

There are things you can do as a parent or caregiver to help keep children safe:

When giving medication:

Library staff member Margaret Meetsma holds some

of the seeds in the Morinville Community Library's

Seed Library, a library of seeds harvested from local

gardens and donated for everyone to use. The current

collection, available at the library, was donated by Le-

gal's Pollinator Pathways. Seed Libraries have the goal

of preserving the local area's biodiversity of plant life.

 Give only the amount indicated on the prescription label, or for

calls to Alberta's non-prescription medication, on the medicine's label.

- Follow the schedule for your children's medication to give them the right amount of medication at the right time.
- Do not use more than one medicine containing aminophen or ibuprofen at the same time.
- Talk to your child's healthcare provider for additional questions about medication dosing.

When storing medication:

- Keep all medications locked up tight, out of sight and reach of children.
- Always put the medicine away after using it.
- Visitors may carry medications with them. Keep their coats and bags out of reach of children.
- Keep medications in their origichild-resistant containers.

Other household items - such as laundry detergent pods, essential oils, hand

sanitizers and toothpaste - can also be poisonous if ingested or used incorrectly. Store cannabis products, e-cigarettes, tobacco products and vitamins with the same precautions as medications.
