



Groundbreaking Ceremony: Town of Legal Arena & Curling Rink Facility Retrofit

The Town of Legal hosted a groundbreaking ceremony on July 19, 2024, at 3:00 pm, marking the official start of the retrofit of the Town of Legal's arena and curling rink facility, located in Legal, Alberta, Canada.

The design of the project began in early

2023 after the Town of Legal was approved for the Government of Canada's Green and Inclusive Community Buildings (GICB) program, receiving a grant of \$7,159,360. The project included much-needed upgrades to the facility, such as an NHL-size

ice surface, female dressing rooms, referee room, accessibility features throughout the facility, and modernization of the lobby area. This project optimized energy efficiency systems, including an improved insulated building envelope and the addition of solar

panels, which reduced energy consumption, greenhouse gas emissions, and lowered operating costs.

Updating this 60-year-old facility created opportunities to increase local usage, ensure sustainable operations, and provide excellent recreational services for residents of the Town of Legal, Sturgeon County, and the surrounding areas, including visitors to the community.

During the project term, the curling rink facility remained open for the regular 2024/2025 season, and the arena was scheduled to open for the 2025/2026 regular season.

The Town of Legal recognized those who contributed and provided support to this project: Government of Canada (Green & Inclusive Community Building Program), Province of Alberta (Community Facility Enhancement Program), Sturgeon County, Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools, Sturgeon Hockey Club, Legal Curling Club, and Sturgeon Valley Fertilizers Ltd.

"Albertans deserve access to modern and safe sport spaces. Today's funding grant for the Legal Arena and Curling Rink is giving Legal residents just that. By retrofitting their existing

facilities, we modernized amenities, improved energy efficiency, and made them accessible community spaces that everyone can enjoy," said the Honourable Randy Boissonnault, Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages.

"Hockey and curling rinks form the cornerstone of communities across this province. As MLA for Morinville-St. Albert, I'm proud of the collaboration between the Town of Legal, Sturgeon Hockey Club, Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools, the

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Morinville Council Briefs

The following Council briefs are from the July 6 regular meeting of Council.

Police Open House

The Morinville RCMP detachment will be taking part in an open house at the Fire Hall on October 5.

A multi-agency partnership, the aim of the event is to receive community input on 2025/2026 policing priorities.

Other RCMP community engagement activities coming up

later this year were reported by administration to council at its regular meeting Tuesday, July 9.

These comprise a frauds and scams educational event in September, with the location and date to be announced; a Pop with a Cop Q & A session for youth November 14 at the MLC; and the Candy Cane Check Stop on December 12 at the Town Hall.

The RCMP has also been invited to attend the Bike Rodeo, Rock the Rails and Lite Up the Nite.

Condolences on the passing of prominent resident

Mayor Simon Boersma expressed his condolences to the family and friends of the late O'Neil Chevalier as one of the council protocol items.

Chevalier, the second-generation owner of Morinville Home Hardware, passed away on July 4 at the age of 84.

The mayor described Chevalier as a cherished family and community member.

"A lot of lives were

touched by O'Neil," he said.

The family has long been a part of the Morinville community, Boersma added.

"It has seen it grow and grow with them, which is pretty amazing."

CAO Evaluation

The annual performance evaluation of Morinville CAO Naleen Narayan took place at the meeting on Tuesday, July 9.

The closed-door evaluation session, lasting just under two hours, included

presentations by the CAO Recruitment and Evaluation Committee and consultants Keldar Leadership.

The closed session of council was said to be justified under the Freedom of Information and Privacy Act, section 17 Disclosure harmful to personal privacy, section 19 Confidential Evaluations, and section 24 Advice from Officials.

Council also went into closed session to discuss a land matter, under FOIP section 16 Disclosure harmful to Third-Party Business, section 24 Advice from Officials and section 25 Disclosure harmful to Public Body.

Indoor or outdoor pool

Council has directed administration to look into the possibility of getting a third party to build and operate a swimming pool in Morinville.

It passed a motion put forward by Councillor Scott Richardson that council direct administration to work with recreation and legal

practitioners to develop a partnership and incentive model that would facilitate the development of an indoor or outdoor pool for budget deliberations.

"The idea is to think outside of the box," Richardson said.

"The best case scenario would be something where a third party comes in and says we'll build a pool and we'll operate it."

Council remuneration committee

Members of the Council Communication Review Committee have now been appointed.

The committee was established in April by bylaw to provide community oversight of town council pay and benefits.

The committee members, appointed by CAO Naleen Narayan, are Fred Bahr, Brian Brost, Kelvin Colliar, Rainer Cubos and Kelvin Kuzyk.

Administration is now working with the members to set an initial meeting date for the committee.

Spreading wildfires prompt evacuation orders and put oil production at risk

With the wildfire situation worsening and reaching Jasper, our thoughts go out to everyone affected and we join other Albertans in hoping that conditions improve quickly.

As of Wednesday afternoon, there were over 175 active wildfires in the province and some 17,500 evacuees (not including visitors to the Jasper area who had other places to return to). The most significant impact is the human toll of the disruption and property loss.

We are monitoring the potential economic impacts.

The situation is highly dynamic and we don't have a complete picture, but we have some early indications

and past wildfire seasons to go on.

Major energy producers have put staff on high alert and implemented emergency response measures.

So far the actual impact on production appears minimal, but risks are elevated. Suncor indicated that it temporarily curtailed some output at its Firebag site. The situation on the ground is evolving, but some sources state that nearly 400,000 barrels per day (bpd) of crude oil equivalent are presently at risk based on proximity to major wildfires.

Last year, about 300,000 bpd of crude oil equivalent were offline for a period of time in May, primarily natural gas and natural gas liquids.

Fortunately, conditions improved, and the disruption was relatively short-lived. Canadian oil and gas output (as measured by real GDP) fell about 4% in May 2023, but fully recovered by July.

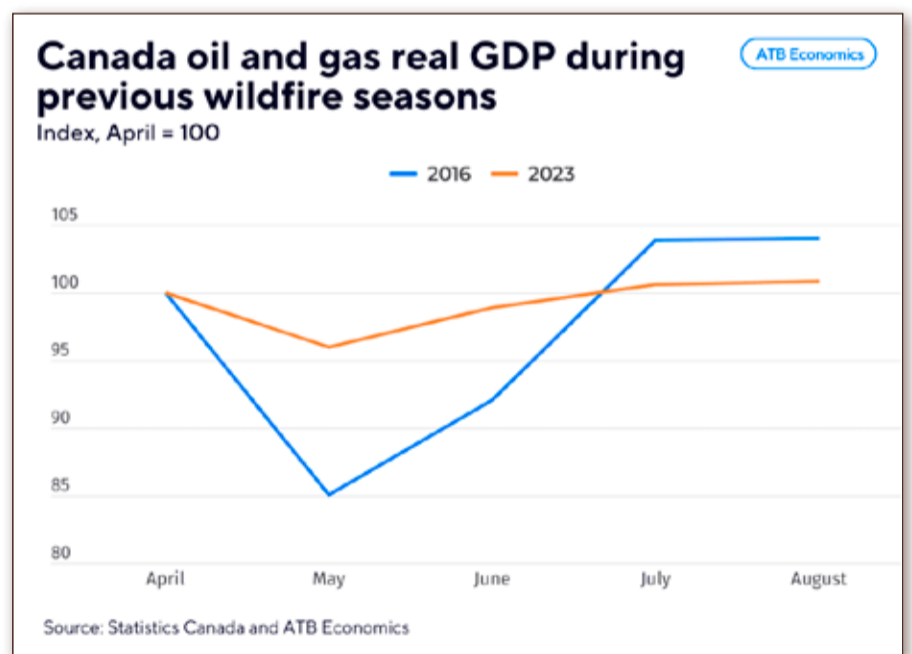
All in, the disruption to production was estimated to shave about 0.1 percentage points from Alberta's GDP growth last year.

But the impacts could be much higher. The 2016 wildfires in the Wood Buffalo area provide an indication of the downside risk.

The 2016 fires hit the major production center in Alberta's oil sands region, temporarily shutting in more than a million bpd of oil production.

That year the drop in oil and gas GDP was 15% in May.

The estimated net



impact to Alberta's annual GDP growth that year was a reduction of 0.6 percentage points.

Outside of energy production and local business activity, a sector that will be deeply impacted by the current fires is tourism. Jasper National Park attracted

2.48 million visitors in 2023 including 475,000 last July.

Around 25,000 visitors and residents have been forced to evacuate.

The entire national park is under an evacuation order, which poses a significant threat for businesses such as hotels and

restaurants operating out of the area and relying heavily on the busy summer months.

The latest report is that the wildfire has reached the Jasper townsite, but the extent of the damages to property and infrastructure remain unknown.

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Danielle Frey takes helm at Morinville Community Library

Danielle Frey steps into her new role as the director of the Morinville Community Library, bringing extensive experience from her previous positions in Spruce Grove, Gibbons, and Rocky Mountain House.

As she joins the Morinville community, she aims to understand its needs, envision potential expansions, and introduce dynamic programming to meet the evolving demands of library patrons.

Frey said she first got involved in libraries when she was finishing her undergrad in Red Deer and seeking a job as a student.

That quest for work led to the Red Deer Public Library, where she worked as a page,

shelving books.

"I figured out that libraries are amazing places to be, especially public libraries, and that's kind of how I started out," Frey said.

Frey went on to get her Master of Libraries and Information Studies degree at Western University in London, Ontario, in 2013 and returned to Alberta, getting a job in a school library in Rocky Mountain House.

Moving into public libraries, Frey spent three years in Gibbons as the Library Manager in the new library in the community's new recreation centre.

"Gibbons was a great little community," Frey said, noting she had taken over from a long-serving

librarian. "It was a new start for the board, and the community was great. [I] got to know the regulars."

One of Frey's fond memories from her time in Gibbons was a successful Lemon and Lavender High Tea fundraiser, which the board had organized.

Frey's most recent role was at the Spruce Grove Public Library, where she spent six years as senior manager.

The Library Director said moving to Spruce Grove from Gibbons was a significant change.

"The staff there and the community are amazing," Frey said, noting the library had a different dynamic from Gibbons.

"A little bit more of a big city feel rather

than the small-town vibe that was in Gibbons, but lots to learn."

Frey joined the Morinville Community Library as Director early in July and feels she has some big shoes to fill taking over for outgoing Library Director Isabelle Cramp.

"The first week I was here, we had a lot of time to talk about things that she had already set in place, and she's very thorough and

organized and helped with the succession and transition," Frey said, noting she was thankful to have a whole week with the long-serving director.

"Now I'm in my first week on my own and still continuing to meet the staff and the community. It's been really good."

Now that she has taken the helm, Frey said her initial goal is to get to know the community and get a handle on the

community's needs.

"I know the community is growing, so I see potential for a reenvisioned library in a different space or a bigger space," Frey said of potential long-term plans.

"I know libraries are always running out of space, so that's always top of mind for anyone who works in the library."

Regarding programming in the existing space, Frey

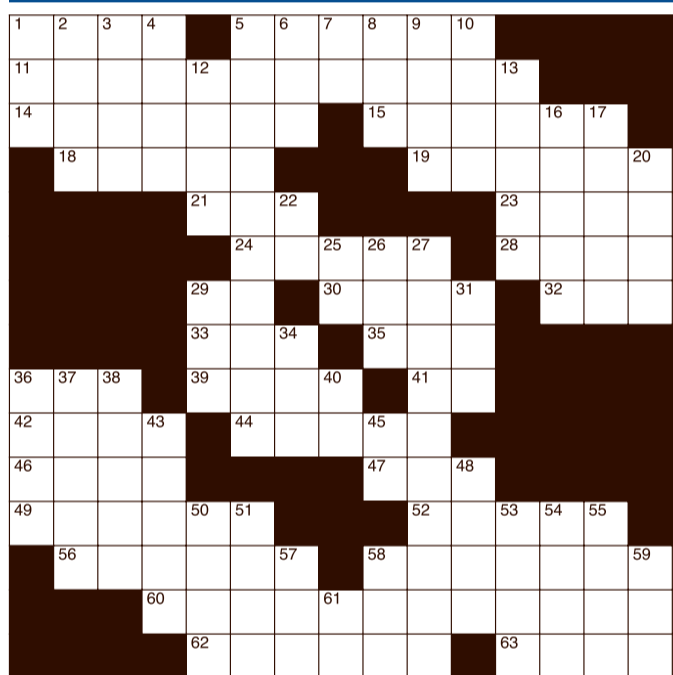

When not working at the library, Frey keeps busy with her family, particularly her young daughter.

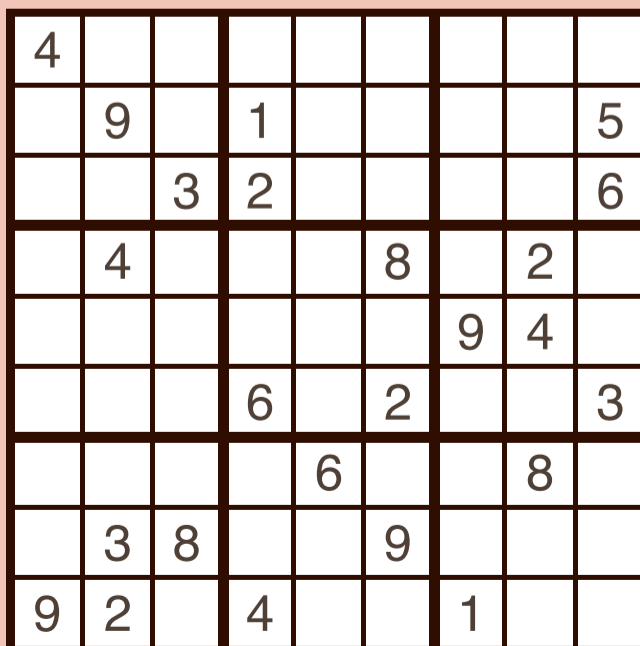
"I'm focused on family and, outside of work, that's my main hobby right now," Frey said.

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




