Johnny's Store in Namao reopening as a cafe, bar, and mercantile

Long considered, at least locally, as Alberta's oldest general store, Johnny's store will officially reopen on Thursday, November 28, after a significant restoration by the McNeilly family.

The latest iteration of the more than a buildcentury-old ing and business will offer a coffee bar, bar area, and unique mercantile shop for locals and visitors to shop and enjoy.

Built almost a century and a quarter ago, in 1902, Johnny's

Store has been in the McNeilly family for generations.

It is currently in the care of siblings Julie-Ann and Brendan McNeilly, who have worked hard to preserve the store's legthe past four years.

passed away during Covid, we contemplated selling the store and property," Julie-Ann McNeilly said, noting despite both her and her brother having busy careers, selling the property did not seem right.

"It was important for us to keep the store in our family and keep the legacy going."

Morinville Council calls special meeting to address budget vote delayed by councillor's absence

Morinville Council was set to hold a special meeting on Tuesday, December 3 to discuss the most recent draft of the 2025 municipal budget.

presented to Council absence was raised by White declined to December 3 at 2 p.m. at its regular meeting on Tuesday, Nov. discussion and decision's were put off because Councillor Scott Richardson was not in attendance.

The issue of his

Councillor Ray White, who said he felt all 26, but substantial members of Council should be present for the vote on the budget.

Stating that he be voting would against the budget,

debate or propose amendments in case a tie resulted in their defeat.

He then moved to refer the 2025 budget to a future meeting of Council, which was set for Tuesday,

The motion passed in a split vote, with White, Deputy Mayor Rebecca Balanko and Councillors Stephen Dafoe and Maurice St. Denis in favour, and Mayor Simon Boersma and Councillor Ien

Anheliger opposed.

Adoption of the draft budget presented at the meeting would result in an estimated property tax increase of 5.82% for next year.

The 2025 tax on an average residential property, valued at \$357,391, would be \$3,047.54, or \$253.96 per month.

Homeowners will be paying \$20.16 a month more in tax, or \$241.96 annually.

The assessed value of the average Morinville home will rise by an estimated \$7,148 in 2025 over this year.

For a commercial assessed property at \$868,427, the annual tax would be \$11,754.60, \$979.55 per month.

tax on \$1,467,820 industrial property would be \$19,867.68, \$1,655.64.

The original draft of the budget presented in September called for a tax increase of 5.75%, or about \$19.95 for a residential property valued at \$350,000.

The budget draft presented by the administration to Council at its November 12 meeting would have resulted in an estimated tax increase of 6.32%.

Council decisions at that meeting resulting in expense reductions included removal from the Operating Budget of the water barrel program, \$8,000, website management initiative, \$30,000, and

municipal census, \$130,000.

The Facilities Master Plan, previously removed from the budget by council, was reinstated. The plan cost is \$130,000.

Replacement of the town's infrastructure services building, deficiencies whose including structural issues and health and safety concerns have been outlined in several reports, has been the subject of much debate.

Included in Morinville's long-term capital plan, adopted in 2023, the cost of a new building was initially estimated at \$6 million, later revised to \$10 million.

A motion pushing back the replacement of the Infrastructure Services Building to 2029 from 2027 was passed by Council at its October 22 meeting, with the design phase set for 2025 at a cost of \$600,000 also delayed.

The current budget draft, reflecting the most recent inspection of the Infrastructure Services Building, sees the cost of repairs so it can be used in the interim drop by \$314,000, from \$564,000 \$250,000.

Considered to need immediate action are HVAC ventilation repairs, \$170,000, and improved hazardous

materials storage, \$80,000.

Another \$50,000 has been added to the 2025 Operational Budget to fund studies of the HVAC, roof structural and load capacity and wash bay relocation for the building, as well as a Phase 2 environmental assessment of its site.

"All renovation decisions and considerations to our plan were secondary to maintaining and preserving the historical integrity of the building," McNeilly explained.

"It was difficult to

renovate the store, not having our dad or grandma around to tell us all the memories and stories about the store. Both from an intrigue standpoint, as well as from a practical one of knowing why things were done a certain way regarding the building and all its quirks. But

we know that they would be so happy and proud of what we have been doing and that we are going to try running the store ourselves just like our grandparents did so many years ago."

McNeilly said running the historic store will offer a well-rounded shopping experience where customers new and old can come in for a coffee, pastry or sandwich in the new coffee nook or shop for quality import and local grocery items as well as some Johnny's branded merchandise.

Customers can also drop by for a drink with friends at the new bar or grab craft beer, wine or spirits to take home.

"The community has been incredibly supportive and has been stopping in to see our progress over the last few years," McNeilly said.

"They are so eager to have the store open again, to create new memories with

the new generation and share the history that everyone has with the store."

The store reopened its doors on Thursday, November 28, and the McNeilly family hopes that Namao and the area residents will join in celebrating this exciting new chapter for Johnny's Store.

PUBLIC HEARING – Bylaw 1660/24 Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17

Sturgeon County Council requests public input on proposed Bylaw 1660/24.

This Bylaw would redistrict a portion of SW-1-55-25-4 from AG - Agriculture District to 13 - Medium Industrial Unserviced District.

The proponent is seeking to relocate and expand their existing business (access mat manufacturing). As this land is currently designated as 'Agriculture District' which does not allow this type of activity, redistricting is being proposed to accommodate or allow for the associated uses.

Each time land is redistricted, a bylaw is needed to amend the Land Use Bylaw, and a Public Hearing must be held.



Morinville RCMP warn residents of grandparent scam involving the impersonation of police officers

Mornivlle RCMP are warning the public of a grandparent scam active in the community.

The victims were instructed that a young relative was in trouble with the police and they were required to withdraw a sum of money for them to be released from police custody.

An audio recording of the victim's young relative was played using AI which was very convincing to the victim.

The scammers also provided the victim with the phone number for the Morinville RCMP detachment, as well as the name of a police officer who actually works at the detachment.

Morinville RCMP wants to remind the public:

- Bail is always paid in person at a courthouse or correctional centre;
- Never send money to anyone you don't know;
- · If a person claims to be a police officer or judge, call that police service or court house


directly to confirm the situation police and courts will never ask for any form of payment;

 Never give out personal information over the phone or online to someone you don't know – the police or courts will not ask for personal information over the phone.

"This is a common scam that victimizes far too many people in our province," says Cpl. Troy Savinkoff, "The best tool to fight this crime is through education. Please talk to your loved ones and ensure that they are aware of this type of scam and discuss the warning signs."
