Since welcoming its first guests in 2005, Sturgeon County Kennels has grown from a modest set-up with just a few kennels to one of the most respected pet boarding and day-care providers in the region.

The business was established with one clear purpose: to offer dogs a calm, safe, and reliable environment while their owners are away. Over the last 20 years, the facility has looked after thousands of pets,

all while upholding a strong commitment to personalized and attentive care.

Nestled along Range Road 241, just off Highway 28 northeast of Morinville, the kennel serves a wide client base, including families from Morinville, Bon Accord, Gibbons, Legal, St. Albert, Edmonton, Redwater, and throughout rural Sturgeon County. Its tranquil countryside location helps create a calm atmosphere, allowing dogs to relax and feel at ease during their stay.

The continued success of Sturgeon County Kennels is built on three foundational values: personalization, calm consistent care, and community connection. Each pet's name, habits, and personality are carefully learned by staff to provide customized attention.

Team members are trained to reduce stress and follow predictable routines that promote comfort and well-being. As a small business, the

On June 14, 2025, over 1,300 kids from more than 66 towns across Alberta took part in Lemonade Day – a province-wide celebration of youth entrepreneurship. Since its inception in Alberta in 2019, Lemonade Day has empowered young participants with real-world business experience while encouraging them to give back to their communities. Over the years, more than \$41,000 has been donated to local charities by these young entrepreneurs, with this year's contribution total still being calculated.

In the Community Futures Tawatinaw Region, dozens of young business owners were recognized for their creativity, dedication, and entrepreneurial spirit. In Thorhild and

Redwater, the "Best Tasting Lemonade" award went to Little Lemons, run by Brielle, Aviel, and Jase Stiller. Lemony Snippets, created by Serenity Clark, Kyleigh Morgan, and Temerance Clark, earned the title of "Best Lemonade Stand," while Patiently Poured, led by Patience Quiring, was named "Best Entrepreneur".

In Legal and Gibbons, the "Best Tasting Lemonade" was served by Wai Lemi, run by siblings Kadence, Arianna, Scarlett, and Ronan Charrios. D.E.P Lemonade Stand, operated by Dallas Conway, Elizabeth McWhirter, and Paisley Moffat, took home "Best Lemonade Stand," and Sweet Sisters Lemonade, led by Cassidy, Alexis, and Brooklyn Kerekes, earned recognition as "Best Entrepreneur."

Morinville also

showcased its local talent. Lemonade Lane by Inara Fisher was awarded "Best Tasting Lemonade." The "Best Lemonade Stand" honor went to Sunshine Citrus, operated by Margaret Werbicki and Dasha Davidenko-Shavyrina.

Raspberry and Rose's Lemonade, created by Avery Fedusenko and Zee-Anne Neto, received the award for "Best Entrepreneur."

Three other winners in the Athabasca and Boyle area and three more in the Westlock Region, also showcased the creativity, determination, and strong sense of community that define Lemonade Day.

Three Sturgeon County athletes to represent Team Alberta

Three local football players are heading to the national stage. Mason Funk, Travis Heal, and Micah Lorenzin have been named to Team Alberta's roster for the 2025 Football Canada U16 Western Challenge.

It's a big moment not just for the players, but for Sturgeon County, which will have strong



representation at one of the most competitive youth football tournaments in

the country.

The path to making the team was highly competitive. It started with over 400 hopefuls- 200 from Northern Alberta and 200 from the south.

From those tryouts, 100 players from each region were selected to compete in a North vs South showcase.

After that, just 66 were invited to a final provincial camp, where coaches made

the tough decision of narrowing it down to the top 40 athletes to represent Alberta on the national stage.

Travis Heal, one of the athletes on the roster, took a moment to thank the people who have helped him reach this point.

"Making Team Alberta Football is a huge accomplishment. Big thanks to my coaches and parents for always pushing me, and thanks to God for guiding me every step of the way."

The U16 Western Challenge will be held in Winnipeg, Manitoba, from June 29 to July 6.

Teams from British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Alberta will go head-to-head in a week-long competition that showcases some of the best young football talent in Western Canada.

With three hometown players in the lineup, Sturgeon County will be well represented when Alberta hits the field.

Debenture Bylaw 1691/25
Vista Road and Range Road 230 to Casa Vista Subdivision

Section 251 – The Municipal Government Act

Take notice that the Council of Sturgeon County, in the Province of Alberta, has given first reading to Borrowing Bylaw 1691/25 which will, upon final passage and approval, authorize the proper officers of the said County to borrow monies from Province of Alberta, or another authorized Financial Institution, to pay for the cost of the rehabilitation of Vista Road and Range Road 230 to Casa Vista Subdivision.

The total cost of the aforesaid project amounts to **\$5,400,000**. A total of **\$4,860,000** is to be borrowed on the credit and security of the municipality at large by a fixed term debenture. The debenture is to be repayable to the Province of Alberta, or another authorized financial institution, in installment payments with an annual interest not to exceed ten per cent (10%), or the interest rate as fixed from time to time by the Province of Alberta or other authorized financial institution.

NOW THEREFORE NOTICE is hereby given by the Council of Sturgeon County that, unless a petition of the electors for a vote on **Bylaw 1691/25** is demanded, as provided for by the terms of Section 231 of the Municipal Government Act, the said Council may pass the said borrowing bylaw.

The proposed bylaw may be examined between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the office of the Legislative Services Officer, Sturgeon County, 9613-100 Street, Morinville, Alberta.

PUBLIC HEARING – Bylaw 1665/24
Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17

Sturgeon County Council is asking for public feedback on proposed Bylaw 1665/24. A property owner would like to continue to operate an existing natural resource extraction operation (Pit 45) on their land at 54309 Hwy 44 (legal land description: NE, NW, SE, SW-20-54-26-W4, NE-19-54-26-W4, SW-21-54-26-W4, and NE-17-54-26-W4).

This application does not propose expanding existing boundaries for aggregate extraction. To issue a new development permit in line with updated Land Use Bylaw regulations, subject lands must be rezoned. The applicant is requesting the land be rezoned to RE-DC2 - Resource Extraction Direct Control 2 District - which allows Sturgeon County Council to establish site-specific criteria and regulations that the operator must follow.

Each time land is rezoned, a bylaw is needed to amend the Land Use Bylaw, and a public hearing must be held. Learn more about the proposed bylaw and how to get involved at SturgeonCounty.ca/hearing-1665/


Written submissions

Gibbons hosts joint training with Morinville firefighters to sharpen critical search and rescue skills

Firefighters from several departments gathered in Gibbons this past week for an intensive and highly specialized training course known as “Dirty Search.”

The hands-on training, delivered by Prairie Dog Fire Training Ltd., brought together members of the Gibbons Fire Department, Sturgeon County Emergency Services, and the Morinville Fire Department for a day of skill refinement, collaboration, and realism-based scenarios.

The goal of the training was to strengthen foundational and advanced search-and-rescue techniques that are vital during emergency responses.

Through physically demanding exercises and simulated fire conditions, participants were able to hone their abilities in key areas such as victim drags and carries, ground ladder operations, oriented and split search methods, and window-entry

and window-based search tactics.

The training took place at a controlled site constructed with large metal shipping containers, offering a safe but challenging space to simulate structural fire conditions.

These types of settings are ideal for practicing search techniques in confined areas where visibility is limited and decision-making must happen quickly under pressure.

Firefighters suited up in full gear and took turns running through a variety of drills designed to mimic real-life rescue scenarios.

Smoke machines filled the interior spaces, forcing participants to rely on their training and each other to locate “victims” and navigate out of the building safely.

Courses like Dirty Search help firefighters sharpen not only their physical techniques but also their mental preparedness.

In an actual emergency, seconds count.

The ability to perform under stress, adapt quickly, and move with confidence can mean the difference between life and death for both victims and responders.

For volunteer departments like those in Gibbons and Morinville, specialized training opportunities like this are especially valuable. Many of these firefighters balance their roles with full-time jobs and family responsibilities, yet

they show up and put in the work to protect their neighbours. Investing in quality training not only supports their personal growth-it directly enhances public safety.

The session also provided an opportunity for collaboration between departments that may work together during larger incidents. Firefighters from different communities built trust and strengthened mutual

aid relationships that can prove critical in times of crisis. In smaller towns and rural areas, this kind of inter-agency cooperation is often essential during major structure fires or multiple-call events.

As fire departments continue to face increasingly complex challenges – from larger structures to evolving building materials and fire behaviours – continuous hands-on training remains essential.

Exercises like this ensure that firefighters stay sharp, stay safe, and stay ready.

Gibbons Fire & Rescue expressed gratitude to Prairie Dog Fire Training Ltd. for facilitating the course and to all the firefighters who participated. The day of learning not only expanded technical skills but reinforced a shared commitment to excellence in service and safety for the communities they protect.
