Public Spaces in Bloom is open to non-residential properties like schools, churches, and businesses.

Best Sustainable Yard recognizes drought-tolerant and environmentally conscious landscaping that shows green living can still be beautiful.

planting season. For those interested in sustainable gardening, the program pairs well with Morinville's Water Conservation Rebate Program, which offers rebates that can


be applied to your utility bill for water-saving efforts.



Scavenger hunt highlights summer and small business in Morinville

This summer, the Morinville & District Chamber of Commerce is inviting residents to take part in a fun and rewarding initiative that not only celebrates the season but shines a spotlight on the town's vibrant local business scene.

The "Where in Morinville?" Summer Shop Local Scavenger Hunt officially kicked off on June 30 and runs right through to the end of August, giving the community two full months to explore, connect, and win.

At the heart of this creative initiative is the idea of turning shopping into an adventure.

Each week, the Chamber releases a new mystery photo – a close-up image snapped somewhere inside a local Chamber member business.

Either option counts as one step closer to a prize – and there are plenty to be won.

Each completed passport acts as an entry into a monthly draw, with prizes donated by local businesses eager to get in on the fun.

Scavenger hunt passports are free and available at the Morinville Chamber of Commerce office as well as from participating businesses.

With a new clue released every Monday at 10 a.m., there's something fresh to look forward to each week.

Whether following the Chamber on Facebook or using the ChamberPerks app, residents can stay in the loop and plan their next outing accordingly.

While the program is certainly lighthearted and fun, it also serves a bigger purpose.

It's one more way the Chamber is encouraging residents to support local businesses – many of which are still recovering from the economic disruptions of recent years.

By participating, residents are helping sustain the shops, services, and entrepreneurs that make up the fabric of

Morinville.

The scavenger hunt also encourages families to get out and explore their community together.

It's an easy, low-cost activity that can be enjoyed by all ages, whether you're a curious child hunting down flamingos or an adult rediscovering some of Morinville's hidden gems.

That family-friendly angle has helped make the hunt a popular summer tradition in the making.

Four things you need to know about cyberbullying

(NC) Today, youth face dangers from more places than ever before.

Every new technology that helps them communicate or find community can also be abused to harass, intimidate and bully. Cyberbullying is a difficult subject to talk about, but silence only creates more opportunity for the danger to grow.

Making online spaces safer starts with educating ourselves on just what youth are facing – here are four things you might not have known about cyberbullying:

- 1. It's more common than you think.** Cyberbullying can take as many forms as there are ways of communicating online. Targets may experience private harassment like threatening or demeaning emails or text messages; the cyberbullying may also be public, like embarrassing photos being released online, or a website or social media page built to make fun of the target. 31 per cent of Canadian youth report having

been cyberbullied, but the real figure may be even higher.

- 2. It leaves a lasting impact.** Unlike in-person forms of intimidation and harassment, cyberbullying can follow a target everywhere they go, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The effects it has on someone experiencing it vary, but can include anxiety, hopelessness, shame, impacted school performance and even self-harm.

- 3. It can cross borders.** While most cyberbullies and their targets know each other, the online nature of the harassment means that it can come from anywhere. It also means that efforts to address cyberbullying in one region can potentially have a global impact.

- 4. Spreading awareness is key.** It

empowers targets and those around them to take action which has been found to significantly cut how often it happens. A Canadian communications agency recently found success with a campaign that raised awareness around cyberbullying in Tunisia. The campaign, "Don't Feed the Monster," aimed to equip teen-aged girls and boys with tools to resist and prevent cyberbullying, while raising awareness among teachers and parents about the dangers waiting for youth online.

Highlights from Sturgeon County Council's regular meeting on June 24

Public Hearing - Bylaw 1681/25 - Municipal Development Plan Modernization

Council held a public hearing to receive submissions for or against Bylaw 1681/25, a proposed update to the County's Municipal Development Plan to improve the Plan's readability and associated communication and engagement with the public.

Council will consider the presentations made during the hearing and any registered written submissions and will make a decision at a future Council meeting.

Public Hearing - Bylaw 1684/25 - Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan (Planning Area 1) Sturgeon Valley South ASP

Council held a public hearing to receive submissions for or against Bylaw 1684/25 which proposes the adoption of the Sturgeon Valley South Planning Area 1 Neighbourhood Area Structure Plan (NASP).

This plan would build upon the existing framework for the area and policies established by the Area Structure Plan (ASP),

allowing developers the opportunity to submit 'Outline Plans' for their respective projects.

Outline Plans are non-statutory planning documents that provide detailed information on land-use and infrastructure requirements (addressing development to a multi-lot subdivision scale).

Council will consider the presentations made during the hearing and any registered written submissions and will make a decision at a future Council meeting.

Consolidated Contract Award Report - May 17 to June 16, 2025

Council accepted the Consolidated Contract Award Report of May 17 to June 16, 2025 as information.

Bylaw 1680/25 - Amendment to Bylaw 1548/21 - Sturgeon Industrial Park Offsite Levy Bylaw - Second and Third Readings

Council gave second and third readings to Bylaw 1680/25, allowing the county to keep the offsite levy rates current and ensuring updated requirements within the Municipal Government

Act are met.

The purpose of an off-site levy is for a municipality to recover costs associated with new or expanded infrastructure required to support development.

Bylaw 1689/25 - Amendment to Heartland Incentive Bylaw 1552/21 - First Reading

Council gave first reading to Bylaw 1689/25, which would allow for an amendment to the existing Heartland Incentive Bylaw to permit implementation of a phased approach to projects considered under this initiative.

Bylaw 1691/25 - Vista Road and Range Road 230 to Casa Vista Subdivision Debenture Bylaw - First Reading

Council gave first reading to Bylaw 1691/25 requesting that Council approve \$4,860,000 in funding from the County's Municipal Infrastructure Reserve for the rehabilitation of Vista Road and Range Road 230 to Casa Vista Subdivision to be repaid with debenture funding.

Fire Mutual Aid Agreements

Council authorized the Mayor and Chief

Administrative Officer to execute the Fire Mutual Aid Agreements with Alexander First Nation, Lamont County, City of St. Albert, and the City of Fort Saskatchewan.

Wetland Replacement Program - Memorandum of Understanding Renewal and Bellerose Park Project Approval

Council authorized the County's Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with Alberta Environment and Protected Areas to renew the County's involvement in the Wetland Replacement Program.

Council also authorized the CAO to provide a landowner letter of support to accompany the

Bellerose Park Wetland Replacement Project proposal submission to Alberta Environment and Protected Areas and approved \$415,000 for the Bellerose Park Wetland Replacement Project (area map here) to be fully offset by funding from Alberta Environment and Protected Areas.

Consideration of Tax Relief for Residential Properties Affected by the Redwater Recreation Area Wildfire

Council authorized the credit or refund of a collective total of \$1,072.60 in 2025 property taxes for the properties impacted by the Redwater Recreation Area Wildfire, as listed here.

Waiver of Property Tax Penalties for Properties Affected by the Redwater Recreation Area Wildfire

Council has approved an extension for residents affected by the Redwater Recreation Area Wildfire who live within the previously designated evacuation order area, identified here.

These residents now have until December 31, 2025, to pay their property taxes without incurring any late penalties.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE STARS Annual Update

Council received the STARS annual update as information.

The County's 'Ally Impact Report' developed by STARS was additionally tabled for Council's awareness.

Tips to protect your child from concussions this summer

Falls are the leading cause of injuries leading to emergency department or urgent care centre visits for children in Alberta, so it's important to stay safe this summer - and that includes recognizing the signs of concussions and preventing them.

A concussion is a brain injury caused by a blow to the head or body, a fall, or another injury that jars or shakes the brain inside the skull.

More than 3,500 children under five years of age visited an emergency department or urgent care centre for injuries when they fell off a bed, chair or other furniture in 2022, according to the most recent statistics.

About 70 per cent of concussion injuries in children are from falls.

To prevent concussions in:

- **Children under five years of age:**
 - Actively watch your child. Make sure they are in a safe environment.
 - Use wall-mounted gates at the top and bottom of stairs.

- Install window guards on all windows on the second floor and above.

- **Children five to nine years of age:**

- Teach your child about safety during wheeled activities.
- Make sure your child wears a helmet during wheeled activities.
- Use child car seats and booster seats correctly.

It can be difficult to tell if your child has a concussion. Watch for:

- A headache that does not go away.
- Changes in the way they play or act, or in their mood.
- Changes in the way they eat or sleep.

Children suspected of having a concussion should stop sports or activities, see a healthcare provider and rest. Rest, followed by a gradual return to activities, is often the best way to recover from a concussion. Always follow your healthcare provider's guidance. Call 911 if your child has symptoms such as vomiting, growing confusion, seizures,

and weakness or tingling in their arms or legs. Visit MyHealth Alberta for more information.




