Tree Dedication Ceremony honours King Charles III

The Royal Commonwealth Society of Edmonton and the Edmonton and Northern Alberta Branch of the Monarchist League of Canada cordially welcomed guests, dignitaries, and members of the general public to a special tree dedication ceremony held on Sunday, September 7, at the Community Garden in the Village of Griesbach, Edmonton. A souvenir program and scroll were presented to those in attendance to commemorate the occasion.

The event marked the Coronation of His

Majesty King Charles III, Sovereign of Canada and patron of the Royal Commonwealth Society. In his honour, the society planted a bur oak tree, symbolizing strength, legacy, and environmental stewardship. A plaque beside the tree honours His Majesty and the significance of the dedication.


The ceremony began with the sound of the pipes, followed by a welcome address from Ian Havin, President of the Royal Commonwealth Society (RCS) Edmonton Branch. The national anthem, "O Canada," was sung, and Bernice Baker led a Moment of

Reflection. Ian Havin then read a Royal Message from the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta, Her Honour, the Honourable Salma Lakhani. In her message, she stated, "I am delighted to see him receive this beautiful living tribute to his contributions to Canada and the rest of the Commonwealth." She added, "I hope the mighty Bur Oak that has been planted in His Majesty's honour at the Griesbach Community Garden will remind everyone who sees it of the strength of those bonds, and the spirit

Final Household Hazardous Waste Roundup scheduled for Oct. 4 in Gibbons

Got household hazardous waste piling up in your shed or garage? On Saturday, October 4, Roserridge Waste Management Services Commission — in partnership with the Alberta Recycling Management Authority (ARMA) — is giving residents one last chance in 2025 to safely dispose of it at the Recycling Roundup in Gibbons.

The event, running from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Gibbons Cultural Centre, gives Sturgeon County area residents a free and environmentally responsible

way to dispose of hazardous household waste (HHW) and unwanted electronics.

"These events give people a safe, free, and easy way to dispose of hazardous materials that should never go in

their household garbage," said Roserridge Executive Director Susan Berry. "It's about keeping harmful chemicals out of our environment and properly handling them."

of the monarch who has been so devoted to maintaining them.”

Mary Hunt spoke on behalf of the Edmonton and Northern Alberta Branch President of the Monarchist League of Canada. She noted how fortunate Canadians are to have a Head of State who is knowledgeable about the country and enjoys being present for major national events. Hunt remarked, “We were delighted that he visited us this year to open Parliament and demonstrate the significance of our constitutional monarchy where we guard ‘the true north strong and free.’” She reflected

on two notable visits King Charles made to Alberta as Prince of Wales: the first in 1977 at Blackfoot Crossing for the Centennial Celebrations of Treaty #7, and again on July 1, 1983, when he opened the World University Games in Edmonton. Hunt emphasized the symbolism of the tree, stating, “The planting of this sturdy tree signifies our joy in his ascension to our throne in 2023.” She continued, “The planting of this tree celebrates both the King’s Reign and his lifelong commitment to nature. The Bur Oak, known for its resilience and longevity, was chosen to reflect the enduring values of service and

sustainability shared by the Crown and the Griesbach community. This tree will stand as a living testament to unity, hope, and the deep ties between Canada and the monarchy as it honours not only His Majesty’s Coronation, but also the generations of military families who have called Griesbach home.”

The bur oak tree, known to live 200–300 years and sometimes up to 400, symbolizes endurance, strength, and wisdom—qualities fitting for a royal tribute and legacy.

The unveiling of the commemorative plaque was carried out by Lisa Olive of the RCS and Ashley

Wiebe of the Monarchist League. The tree dedication was led by Captain (Ret'd) Rev. Ian Olive, CD (Canadian Decoration). A cultural performance

followed, with Kath Baker and Lindy Havin reading a poem titled A Tree for the Crown, written by Mary Hunt. At the conclusion of the ceremony,

attendees were invited to write personal messages and comments to be placed on the tree, which will be forwarded to Buckingham Palace.

Alberta teachers set October 6 strike deadline amid stalled negotiations

Teachers across Alberta have set a potential strike date of October 6 amid ongoing contract negotiations that have

yet to reach a resolution. The Alberta Teachers’ Association (ATA) says the decision was made to give families time to prepare for possible disruptions in the school

schedule. ATA President Jason Schilling emphasized the urgency of the situation at a recent press briefing, noting that educators are ready to

proceed with job action unless progress is made at the bargaining table. He explained that while discussions are ongoing, the deadline for a decision is fast approaching.

Details regarding the structure or scale of the strike have not yet been confirmed, as developments continue to change daily. Teachers had already voted in favor of strike action back in June, and under provincial law, they can legally begin striking any time before or on Octo-

ber 7. Negotiations between the ATA and the Teachers’ Employer Bargaining Association (TEBA) resumed in August but soon broke down again. Teachers are pushing for higher wages and increased support to

Lions Club of Morinville supports Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, a time to shine a light on the challenges faced by children battling cancer and the families who support them. The Lions Club of Morinville is joining Lions Clubs around the world in supporting this cause, raising awareness, and showing the community they stand alongside young patients and their families. Throughout September, the club is engaging in a variety of activities to raise awareness, provide support, and inspire the community to take action.

This month, the Lions Club is hosting a gold-themed fundraiser, using the internationally recognized gold ribbon to honor children affected by cancer. The fundraiser aims to support local initiatives that improve the quality of life for children

undergoing treatment and offer families some relief during difficult times. Funds raised will go toward programs that provide essential resources such as medical equipment, therapeutic services, and recreational activities designed to help children cope with the demands of treatment.

In addition, the Lions Club is partnering with local hospitals to provide care packs, meals, and small comforts for families. Childhood cancer remains the leading cause of disease-related death among children in Canada.

Each year, approximately 1,500 children under the age of 15 are diagnosed with cancer, and while over 80% survive at least five years after diagnosis, the road to recovery is often long and challenging. Treatment can include surgery, chemotherapy, radiation, and other intensive therapies, all of which can have lasting physical, emotional, and psychological effects on both children and their families. The most common types of childhood cancer include leukemia, brain tumors, and lymphomas, each presenting unique challenges for treatment and care.

The emotional and financial toll on families can be profound. Parents may need to take extended leave from work, while siblings and extended family members adjust to the new routines and stresses. Many families face significant out-of-pocket

expenses for travel, accommodations, and additional medical needs. Long-term follow-up care is often required, and children may experience ongoing health issues or developmental challenges related to treatment.

Organizations like the Lions Club of Morinville play a vital role in addressing these challenges.

By raising awareness, providing resources, and funding programs that support research, advocacy, and direct aid, the club contributes to improving outcomes for children and easing the burden on families. Community engagement is a key element of these efforts, helping to ensure that children facing cancer receive the support and attention they need to thrive during and after treatment.

What's Accepted

Residents can bring a wide range of items, including:

- Hazardous household waste with WHMIS or TDG symbols (red diamonds or circular labels)
- Down-the-drain cleaners and products not in original containers
- Computers, laptops, televisions, printers, and other electronics

— “anything with a plug”

- Oil, oil containers, and filters
- Paint and paint-related products
- Propane tanks and canisters

Household waste and blue bag recycling are not accepted at this event.

Year-Round Drop-Offs

This past April, Roseridge began accepting Hazardous Special Products (HSP) year-round at both the Roseridge

Waste Management Center and Roseridge Transfer Station. These are products with Consumer Chemicals and Containers Regulations (CCCR) symbols, such as household pesticides, flammable liquids, and corrosive cleaners.

“If it has a CCCR symbol, we can accept it anytime,” Berry noted. “That makes it more convenient for residents who don’t have to wait for an event.”

Why Participate

Berry said residents are encouraged to bring their items, even if they only have one or two, to keep those items out of the landfill. “This

October event is the last chance this year to safely dispose of hazardous household waste,” she said. “Proper disposal helps prevent contamination of soil and

water, keeping our environment safe for future generations.”

help manage larger class sizes and increasingly complex classroom environments. In response, the provincial government has proposed a 12% wage increase spread over four years and committed to hiring 3,000 new teachers during that time.

Premier Danielle Smith has raised concerns about the financial impact of further wage increases, suggesting

that it could limit the government's ability to hire additional educators or education assistants. The ATA has not made its specific wage request public, stating that they will not discuss figures in the media.

Finance Minister Nate Horner responded to the strike deadline announcement by noting that giving a month's notice could add stress and uncertainty for families. Meanwhile, TEBA has been authorized to

implement a lockout if necessary.

ATA leadership criticized the possibility of a lockout, arguing it would contradict the government's stated support for public education.

The Alberta Teachers' Association currently represents around 51,000 teachers throughout the province. In preparation for a possible work stoppage, school divisions have begun notifying families that all classes, ex-

tracurriculars, and field trips may be suspended if a strike occurs.

One school district superintendent clarified that while school boards do not participate in bargaining, they are closely monitoring the situation and will continue to communicate updates as needed.

Many parents have expressed concern about how a strike could affect childcare arrangements and daily schedules. Some have

said they're unsure how they would manage if schools were to close. Students have also shared worries that missing instructional time could impact their academic performance.

Community organizations are already making contingency plans to assist families. A major childcare provider has announced it will offer full-day licensed care with extended hours in the event of school closures, giving priority

to children already enrolled in part-time programs. Local science centres are also looking into offering day camps, with more information to be released soon.

Even without strike pay, ATA members have expressed strong determination to proceed if necessary, stating that more decisive action is needed. As of now, it is still uncertain whether the strike would involve a complete shutdown or begin in phases.




