The Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC), the independent utilities regulator, will be considering the power plant development application in Proceeding 30261. If you feel you may be affected by this application, you can request to participate and provide input to the AUC before it makes its decision.

You can request to participate by registering and filing a statement of intent to participate by October 17, 2025.

Greenlight Electricity Centre GP Ltd. has applied to construct and operate a 1,864-megawatt (MW) combined-cycle power generation facility. The project is proposed to be located in the Alberta Industrial Heartland on 98 hectares of private land, approximately 8.5 kilometres east of Gibbons, Alberta. Specifically, the project would be located in the east half of Section 10, Township 56, Range 22, west of the Fourth Meridian. The project is proposed to be developed in two stages and anticipated to be fully developed and operational in 2031. The application has been filed under the *Hydro and Electric Energy Act*.







 touched by the recognition of the sacrifices and dedication of the men and women who have served the department throughout its history. The plaque will soon be installed on the department's hose tower as a lasting tribute to their service.

Boersma acclaimed for second term as Morinville Mayor; Council race set for October

As Morinville gears up for its fall municipal election, one position has already been secured. Mayor Simon Boersma will continue to lead the community for another term after being acclaimed to the role, with no challengers entering the race before the nomination deadline.

Boersma, a familiar face in local government and community circles, has lived in Morinville since 2006. A strong

believer in living and working within the same town, he's built a deep connection with the community over the years — both professionally and personally.

Originally from a large farming family, Boersma is a father and proud grandfather. He co-owns Pleasant Homes, a modular housing company, and has had a long career in the building industry. His leadership extended into the broader sector as well, recently serving as President

of the Modular Housing Association of Prairie Provinces.

Community involvement has been a cornerstone of Boersma's public life. He served five years as President of the Morinville & District Chamber of Commerce (2012-2017) and has remained active with the Rotary Club of Morinville, where he held the role of President in 2017 and later became District Assistant Governor (2018-2021). His commitment to helping vulnerable

populations also led him to become an ambassador for Boyle Street Community Services, where he played a key role in supporting access to mobile shower facilities for Edmonton's unhoused residents in 2020.

Named Morinville's Citizen of the Year in 2014, Boersma is widely recognized for his philanthropic work, both locally and abroad. His relationships with Indigenous communities and international contacts have shaped

his vision for building inclusive, compassionate communities.

As he begins his second term, Boersma says he remains committed to strengthening ties with residents and continuing to work toward a vibrant future for Morinville.

While the mayoral seat is uncontested, seven candidates are running for six seats on Town Council. Those on the ballot are:

The municipal election takes place Monday, October 20, with voting open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Morinville Community Cultural Centre. Advance voting will also be held at the same location on October 11, 16, and 18.

Residents will also vote for trustees in the Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools and Sturgeon Public School Division elections.

Veterans honoured at Morinville Legion dinner

On Saturday, September 20, the Morinville Branch 176 of the Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) hosted a special Veterans Dinner, bringing together veterans, family members, and local dignitaries to honour the service and sacrifices of Canada's Armed Forces and RCMP. The evening also featured the presentation of a Canadian Forces Decoration medal and the awarding of two Quilts of Valour.

The evening began with an Opening Ceremony led by Master of Ceremonies and RCL Branch 176 First Vice President, Comrade Patrick Love. The VIP Procession was introduced with a performance by piper Tom Whiting, followed by Sgt-at-Arms Comrade Daniel Peterson. Vocalist Valerie Ralph led the singing of O Canada, and the evening proceeded with a Land Acknowledgement.

Guests were welcomed with souvenir programs placed on each table. These included the dinner menu curated by the Bistro, the Loyal Toast and speaker schedule, and a list of Armed Forces regimental marches.

of the Veterans Food Bank of Edmonton and his wife Sheenan.

Diana Cole introduced the evening's Quilts of Valour presentation, assisted by Elizabeth Cole and Eric Davis. She provided a brief history of the project, which began in 2006 when a local Edmonton

quilter presented handmade quilts to three Canadian Armed Forces members recovering from injuries sustained in Afghanistan. Since then, over 27,000 quilts have been presented nationwide. Each quilt is created by volunteers and includes a personalized

label bearing the recipient's name, a unique ID number, the presentation date, and the name of the quilter. The bilingual label reads: "Handmade with love, respect and gratitude for your sacrifice to Canada. May the hugs stitched into this quilt give

you comfort, strength and love."

The first quilt of the evening was presented to retired Chief Warrant Officer Robin Crane of the Transition Centre, who served for 36 years and completed nine international

Answering the call: Health Link 811 celebrates 25 years

Health Link 811 turned 25 years old this month. Over this quarter century registered nurses and other health professionals have received 27 million calls, providing Albertans across the province with trusted and accurate health information and advice.

“Many things have changed over the years but our commitment to trusted health supports has remained constant,” says Primary Care Alberta CEO Kim Simmonds. “Our strong and mighty team of around 800 professionals is here to support Albertans live their best lives — and is always a call away.”

Health Link launched on Sept. 19, 2000, with 40 employees serving callers in the Edmonton

and surrounding areas. Three years later, Health Link expanded to serve Albertans across the province and, in 2015, the service adopted the easy-to-remember 811 number.

Over the years, Health Link 811 has added specialized supports for dementia, parents and newborns, addiction and mental health, nutrition and rehabilitation. In 2022, the Virtual MD program launched to connect some Health Link 811 callers directly with physicians to reduce unnecessary emergency department visits. Similarly, 911 callers who don't need an ambulance or emergency care are directed to Health Link 811 nurses.

Health Link 811 has also played a key role

in supporting Albertans during disasters and emergencies. The service is often a first point of contact to the healthcare system for Albertans during wildfires and floods. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Albertans relied on Health Link 811 to get trusted health information during an unprecedented public health crisis. Health Link 811 staff answered more than 248,000 calls in a single month, peaking at 12,000 calls in one day.

As the service has grown, so has its usage. In 2024-25, more than 1.2 million calls were made to Health Link 811, a 350 per cent increase from about 277,000 calls in its first fiscal year. Nursing triage services, routine immunization bookings,

and information and referral services are currently the most common reasons Albertans call Health Link 811.

Yvonne Ewanicke is a registered nurse who started with the Health Link 811 team in 2001. She remembers the excitement of being part of a ground-breaking new service.

“Health Link 811 started as this little unknown program 25 years ago and today it is an essential part of the resources Albertans have to take care of themselves

and their loved ones,” says Ewanicke, who is now one of Health Link 811's directors. “What started as a nursing service for one city is now available to every Albertan and supports almost every aspect of their health care journey.”

For Albertans like Melissa McLeod, Health Link 811 is a lifeline. She initially called Health Link 811 because she thought she might be having a heart attack. After talking about her symptoms with a registered nurse, McLeod learned she was

having a panic attack and was given strategies to help her relax. They worked, but she quickly called Health Link 811 back again to manage a new metallic taste she couldn't get rid of.

“I was worried I might die,” said McLeod. “These nurses gave me strategies and support to help me manage my symptoms at home. I commend these amazingly compassionate and helpful angels for this support as they truly are life savers,” explained McLeod.

tours, including Cyprus, Bosnia, Kosovo, Croatia, Jordan, Iraq, and three in Afghanistan. The second quilt, made by Lois Miller of Sherwood Park, was presented to Joe Gosselin, who served 23 years in the Canadian Army with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) and the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (REME). His wife, Kim, spoke of her husband's unwavering dedication, noting his long deployments and sacrifices made in service of Canada. Diana Cole also expressed appreciation for those on the home front who support military personnel while they are away.

A Canadian Forces Decoration (CD) medal was presented to Karl Holmstrom by Comrade Patrick Love, recognizing his service to Canada.

MLA Dale Nally brought greetings on behalf of the Government of Alberta, expressing his honour at attending and congratulating all the evening's recipients.

He reflected on his own family's military history, sharing that his grandfather served as a paratrooper on D-Day, though he rarely spoke of it.

A solemn moment in the evening was marked by the Fallen Comrade Ceremony, which focused on a single, empty table near the head table. The setting served as a tribute to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. Each element of the table had symbolic meaning: the white tablecloth for purity of motive, a red rose for the blood shed and the loved ones left behind, a red ribbon to symbolize remembrance, a slice of lemon for the bitterness of their fate, salt for the tears of their families, an inverted glass as they cannot join the toast, empty chairs in their absence, a lit candle for the light of hope, and a Canadian flag for the sacrifice made in service of the nation. Members of the Canadian Army, Navy, Air Force, and RCMP stood as Guards of Honour during a moment of silence to pay tribute.

The evening included the tradition of passing the port and the canter, always to the left and without striking the table. Capt. Lawrence led the Toast to the King, and the Loyal Edmonton Regiment Band was warmly applauded for their performances throughout the evening, as was piper Tom Whiting.

The event concluded with thanks to numerous local sponsors for their generous donations of door prizes, including Sobeys, Jiffy Lube, Flower Stop, Tim Hortons, Foxhole Canteen, Coach's Corner, and Adam Roddis, Manager at Dignity Memorial.

The Morinville Legion's Veterans Dinner was a moving tribute to the courage, dedication, and enduring spirit of those who serve Canada both at home and abroad.



Thinking of Displaying Election Campaign Signs? Here's What You Need to Know

As election season ramps up, candidates and their teams are preparing to get the word out — and campaign signage is one of the most common ways to do it. However, before putting up any signs or distributing materials, it's important to understand and follow all applicable municipal by-laws and regulations regarding election campaigning. These rules cover everything from where signs can be placed to what kind of campaigning is allowed in certain areas.

Campaigning in public spaces is permitted, including placing signs along roadways, sidewalks, and parks. That said, campaign signs must be installed in a way that does not pose a hazard to drivers,

cyclists, or pedestrians. Improperly placed signs that block visibility or interfere with public infrastructure may be subject to removal. Campaign materials should also be secure, clearly labeled, and respectful of other candidates. Plagiarism or imitation of another candidate's signs or slogans may be subject to legal or ethical complaints.

It's also crucial to understand that campaigning is strictly prohibited at polling stations. This means candidates and supporters may not place signage on polling property, hand out campaign literature, solicit votes, or otherwise interfere with the voting process. These rules are in place to ensure that voters

can cast their ballots in a neutral and pressure-free environment. Each municipality may have slightly different signage regulations, including limits on the size and height of signs, setback distances from roads and intersections, and requirements for removing signs after the election. To avoid violations, candidates are strongly encouraged to familiarize themselves with all relevant local rules.
