Morinville RCMP stepping up for childhood cancer

Every year, too many families hear words no parent should ever have to face. Pediatric and childhood cancers don't just affect young patients – they reshape entire families, classrooms, and communities. This spring, the Morinville RCMP is joining the fight by participating in a Cops for Cancer fundraiser at Sturgeon Composite High School. During

the event, police officers from the detachment will volunteer to have their heads shaved by local students, raising funds and awareness for pediatric cancer research and programs that support families affected by the disease. The funds raised through Cops for Cancer help the Canadian Cancer Society fund groundbreaking pediatric cancer research and send 600 children each year to Camp Goodtimes. This medically supervised camp provides children and teens with cancer – and their families

– a safe place to play, make friends, and take a break from the daily challenges of living with the disease. George Prefontaine, an Auxiliary RCMP member in Morinville, shared his personal reason for participating in the fundraiser: “Having been an Auxiliary RCMP member for 14 years in Morinville and having family members diagnosed with cancer – my dad in 1998 with prostate cancer, my mother diagnosed with stomach cancer, and my own cancer scare in 2020 – it's time for me to give back. This is my

reason for getting my head shaved.” Prefontaine's story reflects why so many communities across Canada support Cops for Cancer. The initiative began in 1994 when a single police officer

wanted to make a difference in the fight against childhood cancer. Since then, it has grown into one of the country's largest fundraising efforts, with first responders from coast to coast raising nearly \$61

million to support research, innovative treatments, and families living with cancer. The Morinville RCMP is aiming to raise \$3,000 during

Every dollar helps ensure more resources go directly to the children and families who need them.

Events like this show that fighting cancer is not something one person or organization can do alone.

By coming together as a community, police officers, students, families, and supporters can make a real difference in the lives of children facing cancer.

In addition to fundraising, the event is a visible demonstration of community

support. Students who volunteer to shave the officers' heads take an active role in supporting the cause, creating a powerful connection between the RCMP, local youth, and families affected by pediatric cancer.

These moments of

participation build awareness and inspire others to contribute to the fight.

The Canadian Cancer Society emphasizes that every contribution counts. Funds raised support pediatric cancer research that drives breakthroughs in treatment,

helps children maintain quality of life during treatment, and provides support programs for families navigating the emotional, financial, and medical challenges of a cancer diagnosis.

Morinville Public School participates in Jump Rope for Heart

Morinville Public School students are spending the next month skipping their way to better heart health while supporting a good cause.

The school is participating in Jump Rope for Heart, a program that encourages physical activity while raising funds for the Heart and Stroke Foundation.

The challenge kicked off with a school assembly, where students learned about the program and why it matters.

The assembly included skipping demonstrations from the school's own Dragon Tamers, giving students inspiration and ideas for their own practice.

Jump Rope for Heart encourages children to be active while learning about heart health and the importance of giving back.

Students are taking part in a month-long effort to raise funds, combining fitness, teamwork, and community involvement.

Fundraising is ongoing, and community members can contribute online at <https://jumpropeforheart.crowdfunder.ca/118979>. Donations support research, education, and programs that help prevent and treat heart disease.

The event will culminate on March 11 with Jump Event Day. Students will put their skipping skills to the test and celebrate the efforts of the past month.

Teachers and staff are encouraging participation from all students, whether they are actively skipping or cheering

on classmates. In the weeks leading up to the event, students are practicing different skipping techniques, from single rope jumps to group routines.

Many are setting personal goals, and some classes are planning creative challenges to showcase during Jump Event Day.

Parents and community members are invited to support the students by attending the event or making a donation.

The school hopes that the combined efforts of students, staff, and families will make a meaningful impact on heart health research and education.

Jump Rope for Heart has a long history across Canada, involving hundreds of thousands of students each year.

The total cost of the aforesaid project amounts to **\$2,600,000**. A total of **\$1,300,000** is to be borrowed on the credit and security of the municipality at large by a fixed term debenture. 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
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Germain Robert Fortier
